TOWN OF ARBORG BY-LAW NO. 8-2004

Being a By-law of the Town of Arborg to Provide For the Regulating of Loitering and Public Nuisances.

WHEREAS pursuant to Section 232(1) of *The Municipal Act* of Manitoba Chap. M225 states in part that a council may in a by-law:

"232(1) A Council may pass by-laws for municipal purposes respecting the following matters:....
(b) people, activities and things in, on or near a public place or a place open to the public, including parks, municipal roads, recreation centers, restaurants, facilities, retail stores, malls, and private clubs and facilities that are exempt from municipal taxation."

AND WHEREAS Council is desirous and views it in the best interest of the Town of Arborg to establish regulations for deterring of loitering and public nuisances in the Town of Arborg.

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Town of Arborg duly assembled enacts as follows:

- 1. "Loitering" means to linger idly.
- 2. **THAT** no person shall by any manner of conduct commit any public nuisances by collection, loitering, or standing as idlers, on any of the streets or sidewalks of the Town of Arborg, or on the steps of, or approach to, a house or other premises open to the public street, whereby the public are liable to be subjected to disturbance or annoyance.
- 3. **THAT** any person intervening the provisions of this by-law may be arrested without warrant by any peace officer having jurisdiction within the Town of Arborg.
- 4. **THAT** the person who contravenes the provisions set out in this by-law shall, for each offence, be liable upon summary conviction to a fine of not less than \$100.00 and not greater than \$300.00 plus costs. Each contravention of this by-law shall be deemed to be a separate offence.
